## Physical and Spiritual

Every Sunday as another candle has been put out in the Lenten journey to the cross, I have been struck by the discord between the spiritual and the physical aspects of Holy Week, of Easter.

### *The spiritual:*

To sit quietly and consider the last meal Jesus had with his disciples in the upper room.

To walk the cross while and meditating on the events of Jesus passion.

The passion that drove Jesus him to walk to his death.

To ponder the ramifications of the torn veil for us over 2000 years later.

On Sunday morning to come together and contemplate the site of the empty tomb.

But there is a *physical reality* to Easter. Jesus didn't live in a sterile, isolated or quiet time and place. There were people crying out for his blood. There were people chanting, clapping, yelling for the death of this man. There would have been sobbing and weeping as his friends tried to understand what was going on. There was heat, there was hunger. The practical stuff of every day would have gotten in the way for some. For one person we know there was the despair of betrayal. For each person at some

point there was a choice to be made. Do they carry on the path they set for themselves – either in their silence or in their joining the throng of the crowd. Or do they turn and focus their gaze on Jesus.

There is nothing more physical than the cross, the battle in death and the resurrection. And yet the cross and the victory over death also opened the way for us to step into a new spiritual reality. A new covenant became available for us that first Easter – such is God's love for us.

My hope is that we would embrace the physical nature of following Christ as much as we embrace the spiritual reality offered to us through Christ. Everyday we can chose to turn our gaze to Jesus, we can chose to acknowledge the veil has been torn. Everyday we can live as people redeemed by the work of the Cross, we can live as forgiven people, we can live as beloved of God. This is not just our spiritual reality, it is our physical reality also -such is God's love for us.

**Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.**

## Musings from your past Session Clerk.....

Yes, as was announced at our last Congregational meeting, (8 March) I have resigned as Session Clerk (but am still an Elder) and we are very grateful to Rena Cowie for agreeing to take over; thank you Rena! My decision to resign was for personal reasons; I recognised that I was not giving the time & commitment needed to do the job properly and that was neither honouring to God, nor fair on the congregation.

As my parting 'report' I think this is also an opportune time to elaborate on why Session decided to invite Rev Erin Pendreigh to be our Interim Minister for a short period. I would like to clarify; Erin is **NOT** here on a trial basis for a future permanent charge: She is here for a specific purpose & finite period of time.

Looking back over the past year... We always knew that it would take some months before we could expect the Settlement Board process to recommend a new minister to the congregation. Session was of the opinion that this period would be a good opportunity for us to explore and exercise our God-given leadership talents and also enjoy the ministry of a variety of visiting preachers. Consequently, we made a conscious decision not to seek an interim minister initially and I trust that you have been blessed in sharing in the varied leadership styles we have enjoyed during this time.

Shortly before Christmas, we had that intense period of excitement when we thought we had found the right minister. When it did not turn out the way most expected, the aftermath left some feeling disillusioned, disenfranchised and, rather flat. Ian Guy, our Interim Moderator and Settlement Board Convenor, encouraged Session to consider an Interim Ministry Position to help us through this period. Session drew up parameters (as published in the weekly Bulletin a few weeks ago) and Erin was not only available and willing, but suited the role admirably. Hence we asked her and she is now with us!

We are hugely grateful to Erin for what she is doing amongst us. Erin has lightened the load of the leadership team immensely (including taking the pressure off the Settlement Board as they resume their search on our behalf.) In leading & preaching, guiding & helping, Erin is providing a stable environment in which we feel safe to 'take time to smell the roses'; to 'wait on the Lord' without pressure and refocus on what unites us - what is important – unity in Christ - rather than the things which separate us. Additionally her charisma & energy has motivated us to get moving again on some practical matters which had stalled somewhat, and better prepare us a parish to welcome a new long term minister, whenever that may be.

I would like to leave you with two versions of an Aurora Australis image from 17 March....

To me these symbolise how I see (or don't see!) many things, including God...

Paul, in 1 Cor 13:12, talks about 'seeing dimly'. O how familiar is that?!

The first image depicts vaguely what the naked eye sees (our eyes are very poor at perceiving colour in low light) and the second what the camera sensor 'sees' (the sensor is vastly more sensitive to colour in low light.) I need the camera's power to 'see' what is actually there. Perhaps we need a magic digital sensor to interpret life for us? To find meaning in Bible readings, to find meaning in life's problems? To an extent we can help each other, but that is the Holy Spirit's job; to shine the light on Jesus; to illuminate, to interpret; to make plain. With His help, the mundane becomes interesting and heavy loads are lightened; it's all part of that living life abundantly that we have been talking about;

*why* do we find it so hard to do?!

## Family Focus and Kids Friendly Ministry

On March 16 we had our first Checkpoint Meeting for the year. Representatives from Rainbow Club, mainly music teams and youth teams attend these meetings (quarterly) to pray for our ministry to children, youth and their families as a whole, to encourage unity of direction, to increase our understanding of the various Children's Ministry work and to offer practical support.

We are encouraged, as we review this year's progress in these early months, and happy to report to the wider congregation that our 2015 Children's Ministry year is off to a steady start.

### Wanaka



At the moment we have 55 families registered which is about the same as this time last year (57 were registered on 11 March last year, 61 on 18 March).

Attendance has been good with particularly large numbers last week (about 40 families). The group seems to include more babies this year.....

I wonder whether some older ones have places in a pre-school programme on a Tuesday morning this year.

We are still looking for another song leader for Wanaka. However Lucy Davey has managed to start the year with a bang and Inez McClea is doing actions up front with Lucy, with a view to being able to step into this role if needed. Kathy Dedo and Karen Wells have said they can be contacted if an emergency arises but of course may not always be available.

This year we were asked by Rachel Beatie from AccessAbility if we would be prepared to allow Renon Sasaki to help at mainly music. She is a Year 13 student at Mt Aspiring College, though not doing a full programme. The school agreed to free her from 9.00-11.20am on a Tuesday. This arrangement is working out well. She is willing to help with whatever she is asked to do such as setting up the hall, handing out morning tea and helping to get out the toys. Her great pleasure is playing with the babies!! Jen Lewthwaite is keeping an eye on her as she settles in. It seems like a useful community service we can do.

We are looking ahead to a special Easter programme and have bought books called "Surprise!" from mainly music. Lucy is developing a programme around this for the last day of Term 1 (31 March).

We feel it is really important to offer the Christian significance of Christmas and Easter and these are the times we try to give a book with a Christian theme. This one has been written for mainly music groups, and we hope pre-schoolers will like it. We will also have Easter eggs for everyone!

Our end of year balance (31 Dec) showed a closing balance of \$1742.55 which gives us good security to start the year. This is thanks to a generous donation from Robin Copland to pay for the new TV set at Hawea. We bought a stand for it and Powerpoint software to run our sessions, but not having to pay for the TV helped our finances enormously. We are also grateful to the Lighthouse Church for a regular monthly \$20 donation. We plan to use this to get some new props (perhaps maracas or bells). And of course we are always most grateful to WPCCC for the free use of the Hall each week. At the end of each year we assess our finances and try to give a donation to WPCCC (in 2014 the TV and stand for St Ninians) in appreciation, but it in no way approaches the true value of the Hall. Thank you for your support and please keep us and our families in your prayers.

## RAINBOW CLUB

When we last reported we were excited about celebrating Christmas, and now it is almost Easter! Do you remember we were saving up to buy a piglet as a Christmas gift for a family who had been affected by leprosy? WELL, we saved up enough to buy the piglet, AND a fish farm—which would help a whole village; AND a seed basket - to help a family set up a market garden; AND a pair of sandals for protection for feet injured by leprosy!! The children did so well, and they got a special letter of thanks from Leprosy Mission New Zealand.

It was good to share Rainbow Club with visitors during the summer holidays—there were visitors from Australia as well as all around New Zealand.

Now we are in this season called LENT. It is the time leading up to Easter Day—six weeks—where we wonder about God's ways and learn about God's promises. The first PROMISE was when God put the rainbow in the sky after the flood, and Noah's Ark saving Noah and his family, and the animals and birds. God's promise is never to send a flood like that again, and God asked that we look after the earth—the plants and the animals and the birds and the fish AND people.



We made rainbows with coloured paper and thought about how God looks on the rainbow when we look at it too. Then there was God's PROMISE to Abraham that all the families of the earth would be blessed through Abraham and Sarah. When they were very old they had a baby boy whom they called Isaac which means *LAUGHTER*, because Sarah laughed when she heard she was going to have a baby even when she was old. God's promise to Abraham has been kept, because Jesus came, showing us God's forgiveness and love.

We have looked at Psalm 19 where the songwriter told us that the sun and the moon and the stars and all of creation tells of God's love and beauty without words!! 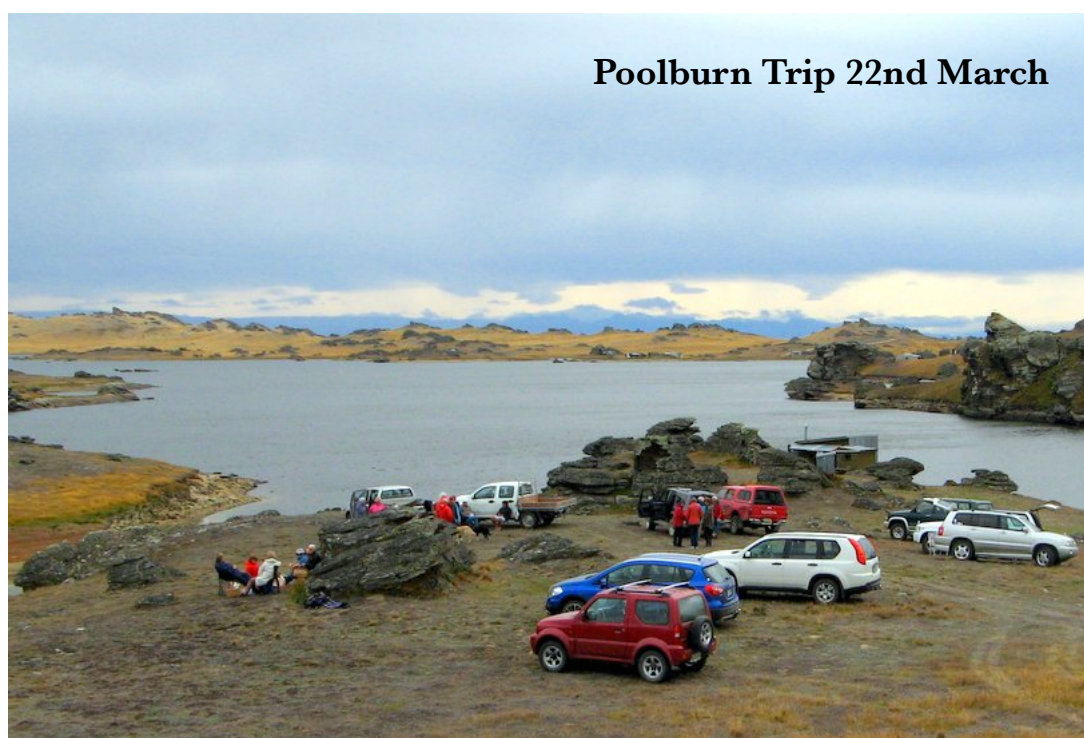
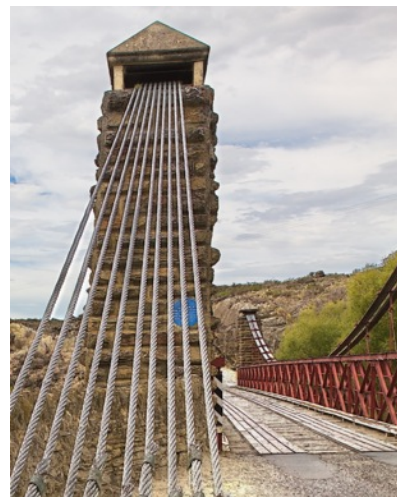

## From The Youngs In Malawi



Michael Mvula is one of the African Evangelical pastors near Lilongwe. We attended a special service at his church recently to mark his leadership of the Lumbadzi congregation. He is very keen on childrens work and is helping us in his area. He is an Albino and that is a big issue in Malawi at present. Tragically, Albinos are going missing especially children as there is a demand for human parts in traditional rituals. It is estimated that there are 7,000 Albinos in Malawi.



Oral learning seminar participants. We took part in this recently. It is becoming an important part of our training of teachers. Stories are past

down the generations in villages and Bible stories can be a part of that also.

Alongside having lesson books and visuals, we are giving teaching on telling bible passages orally and then getting the children to learn it and/or put it to drama and song. The key aspect is to apply the teaching by asking questions like 'what do you like about the story? What does it teach us about God? How can you apply it to your life? In societies with a high level of illiteracy it is a powerful way for people to learn Bible truths.

- for money given from a NZ church to replace our landcruiser and buy a replacement car for Diane.

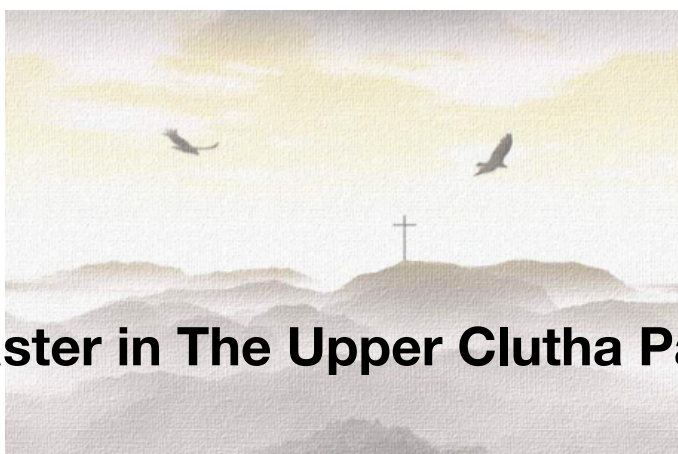
### Pray:
